NAIDOC Week 6th - 13th July 2025

National NAIDOC Week is celebrated across Australia in the first week of July each year (Sunday to Sunday) to honour and recognise the history, culture, and achievements of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples. It is a time for all Australians to learn about First Nations cultures and histories and to participate in celebrating the oldest continuous living cultures on Earth.

The theme for 2025, 'The Next Generation: Strength, Vision and Legacy', marks 50 years of NAIDOC Week. It invites us to reflect on the strength and achievements of the past while celebrating the bright future being shaped by the next generation.

Throughout the week, our school will acknowledge the contributions of our Elders by engaging in classroom discussions and activities that honour and explore the significance of NAIDOC Week.



Wheelie Wednesday

Following feedback from our students, Wheelie Wednesday is back this term. 'Wheelie Wednesday' provides the opportunity for students to bring along their bike or scooter and safety gear and have fun riding at lunchtime (sorry no skateboards or rollerblades!) To ensure the safety of all we will rotate each week between the juniors and seniors. Week One our year 3-6 students are invited to participate in 'Wheelie Wednesday'. To participate students must have the required safety gear including an Australian Standards approved helmet and follow the set rules below:

- No sharing of bikes and /or scooters and helmets.
- No over arm flips with scooters.
- Students are to ride in the one direction to avoid any head on collisions
- No jumps off of any surface
- Bunny hops ok on scooters

Students not following set rules will be asked to put their bike or scooter away for the remainder of lunch.

School Review

As you may already be aware from previous communications, we are approaching our School Review. This important process occurs every four years and involves a rigorous evaluation of our school's performance. It provides an opportunity to reflect on our previous goals, assess outcomes, and set a clear direction for the next four years.

The findings and recommendations from the external reviewer will inform the development of our next School Strategic Plan (SSP) — the guiding document that shapes our work for the following four years. Each year, schools also develop an Annual Implementation Plan (AIP) that breaks down the SSP into focused yearly actions.

We look forward to this process, as it allows us to celebrate what has worked well at Birregurra Primary School, while also identifying opportunities to improve and refine our practices. It's a chance to sharpen our strategic focus and continue building a strong future for our school.

Staff have been working hard on preparing the necessary documentation, which is a detailed and thoughtful process. Our first review day is this *Thursday*, and it will be a valuable opportunity to reflect on the achievements of the past four years and plan ahead. The review panel will spend the day examining key documentation, observing in classrooms, and gaining deeper insights into our school's practices and culture.

The panel includes myself, Alistair Burrell, Brendan King, Brendan Bush (our SEIL), two Challenge Partners, and our School Council President, Rob Lidgerwood.

The second review day will take place in Week 2, on Wednesday 30th July.

A big thank you to the panel for generously giving their time and expertise to support this important process. We're looking forward to two productive and insightful days.


Clubs

Life Education



On *Thursday 31st July*, students in Grades 3-6 will engage in the 'Talk About It' Program facilitated by a trained professional from Life Education.

Children in Years 3 & 4 will engage in a session titled 'Body Safety' and learn to recognise and express their feelings, understand when they feel unsafe, know who to report concerns to, distinguish between body parts, understand consent and boundaries, differentiate between safe and unsafe touch, and practice protective behaviours.

Our Year 5's will develop an understanding of the physical, social and emotional changes that occur during puberty through the 'Welcome to Puberty' module.

Year 6 students will engage in the 'Thriving in Puberty' module which is an extension of the Welcome to Puberty module they completed last year. If you have any wonderings regarding these sessions, please make contact.

Update On Suspension and Expulsion Powers

Our school is committed to providing a safe, respectful and inclusive environment for all students and staff.

You may be aware of recent changes announced to suspension and expulsion powers that will be available to Victorian principals from today, day one of Term 3, (Monday 21 July 2025).

We know that students' behaviour outside of school, particularly online, can sometimes impact the safety of students and staff at school.

In exceptional circumstances, principals of Victorian government schools will be able suspend or expel students for behaviour that occurs outside of school grounds and/or hours including online, if it poses a significant danger to the safety and wellbeing of students or staff.

These powers apply only to serious incidents where there is a clear and close connection to the school and the behaviour of a student outside of school unreasonably impacts the safety and wellbeing of students or staff at school, and their ability to learn or work. Please note:

- · They do not apply to behaviours unrelated to the school or school community.
- · They only apply to behaviour which occurs from Monday 21 July 2025 onwards.

Suspension and expulsion will remain measures of last resort – our primary approach continues to focus on proactive and positive behaviour support, including working with you to teach students the behaviours we expect of them, in school and in life.

Thank you for your continued support as we work in partnership to educate and support our young people.

Healthy Screen Time Agreements

School holidays can see the relaxing of rules and boundaries around many household structures. In my experience this can include bedtimes, meals and screen time. While rest and relaxation are important so too are routines, structure

and discipline. Living in a digital word whereby children have easy access to screens, and the internet requires careful guidance and support from parents.

Setting ground rules around the use of screens and devices from an early age supports children to develop healthy screen time habits. Engaging children in discussion about healthy screen time habits empowers children and provides them with a sense of ownership over the decision.

A family screen time agreement is a set of boundaries around the use of devices in the home. It incorporates not only the volume of time spent on screens but also when and where screens are used. It


can also include when certain devices are used and for what purpose [social media, gaming etc.]

Children begin to understand boundaries around the age of three, so those of you with younger children this is the perfect time to start.
